



PAUL ALLEN | Co-owner - R.C. Hatton Inc. FL SESSION: Panelist, Procurement for Producers by Producers

SESSION: Share Tables and Food Recovery in K-12

Karena Bozarth began her career at Orange County Public Schools in 2010. During this time, Karena has had the opportunity to work in several departments, which include Food Service, Procurement, and currently in Sustainability. In 2018-2019, Karena worked closely with the 4Roots Farm at Ocoee High School to streamline a procurement process of freshly harvested produce between Food and Nutrition Services and Orange County School Greenhouse for use in the cafeteria. The goal of this process was to assist in educating students on the importance of good nutrition in our school meals, support the agriculture curriculum, and to generate revenue for continued growth and harvest of hydroponic Romaine lettuce, beefsteak tomatoes, and cucumbers.

In 2021, Karena was asked to develop and head-up the OCPS-FNS food recovery program. With passion and dedication in this area, she has built the program from two schools to almost 50 schools, donating over 140,000 lbs. of food to local community partners. In addition, Karena has created waste diversion strategies for school gardens' composting and other farm-to-school activities.

Karena's free time is spent in the garden, spending time with her family and friends, and relaxing on the beach.



MARTINA BRAWER | Executive Director, Florida School Nutrition Association, Inc.

SESSION: Write, Edit, and Celebrate - Grant Writing Strategies that Tug the Heart and Excite the Brain of Your Funders

Arianne's work is focused on efforts to improve children's access to healthy, high-quality food in schools and community settings. She is particularly interested in supporting local food systems in Hillsborough County as cofounder of Locally Grown and an advisory committee member of the Homegrown Hillsborough food system coalition. In her role as Administrative Branch Manager, she manages several programs: Farm to School, the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program, Chefs in Schools, and Junior Chef. Garland and her husband reside in Mt. Sterling, Kentucky on her family's sixth generation farm where she enjoys farming, horseback riding, hunting, cooking, and quality time with her family, especially her four grandchildren. Her active service on various program advisory boards (Sterling Community Food Coalition, UK Cooperative Extension Nutrition Education Program, and USDA Southeast Region Junior Chef) demonstrates Garland's dedication to agriculture at the local, state, and national levels.



MARY LYNN HESS | K-5 STEM Resource Teacher SESSION: Panelist, Gardening for Teachers by Teachers

Mary Lynn Hess, a distinguished K-5 STEM resource teacher, possesses a global reach, sharing her expertise as a speaker at local, state, and international levels. She was recognized with the 2021 National Excellence in Teaching about Agriculture Award for her innovative teaching approach. She is also an active member of the NSTA Early Childhood-Elementary Science Teaching Committee, contributing to national science education initiatives. As the 2022 Seminole County Agriculture Educator of the Year, she solidifies her role as an influential figure in STEM education. Her speaking engagements at various platforms, including the Epcot International Flower and Garden Festival, where she presented "Edible Education," attest to her ability to engage and inspire audiences with garden-based teaching methods. Moreover, Mary Lynn's commitment to education extends to her personal goal of sharing her expertise with students, staff, and colleagues, expanding curiosity, and offering fresh ideas in agricultural literacy through lessons, garden clubs, and staff meetings, thereby enriching educational experiences for all.



GLYEN HOLMES | Executive Director, New North Florida Cooperative SESSION: Panelist, Procurement for Producers by Producers

Glyen Holmes is the forward-thinking Executive Director of the New North Florida Cooperative located in Marianna, FL. He has a solid history of accomplishments in the Farm to School and Community Food Insecurity Implementation arena.

Since 1995 he has: established and successfully carried out the first Farm to School (F2S) Program in the United States; worked with over 100 school districts across six states (Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Arkansas, and Tennessee) training school district personnel and Socially Disadvantaged Farmers (SDF) on the implementation of F2S programs; worked hand in hand with the National Farm to School Network to get the National Farm to School Grant passed through Congress; brought in more than \$5 million in grant monies in an effort to help support F2S activities in the South/Southeast; developed a product line that can be grown, processed, and delivered by SDFs to their local school districts; developed a distribution system consisting of seven refrigerated trucks as a means to aggregate produce from SDFs for F2S markets; and has consistently worked with national, state, and local agencies throughout the South/Southeast.



BRETON HOMEWOOD | Policy, Systems, and Environment Specialist, UF/IFAS Family Nutrition Program

SESSION: Panelist, Gardening for Teachers by Teachers

In his role as PSE for UF/IFAS Family Nutrition Program, Breton provides PSE changes to SNAP-ED eligible youth in seven counties - Alachua, Dixie, Gilchrist, Suwannee, Levy, Madison, and Lafayette. Breton loves building gardens in schools as well as advising early childhood education centers on GONAPSACC and nutrition/development improvement strategies. An educator at his core, Breton has collaborated with Florida Ag in the Classroom to teach teachers statewide in the School Garden Leadership Training series. Breton has his master's from the University of Florida in Sustainable Development Practices, having done his research in Western Honduras with a focus on gender and nutrition. Breton's passions and career goals were formed during his service in the U.S. Peace Corps in Paraguay from 2012-2016. He is an advocate for "Partnership Farming" where farmers are paid fairly for what they grow, no food is wasted, and everybody eats good in the neighborhood. In 2021, he was recognized as Community Hero by the Atlanta Braves Foundation for Flint River Fresh's work during the COVID outbreak where they distributed thousands of produce boxes and hot meals to essential workers during the height of the pandemic.

Flint River Fresh helps people grow vegetables and fruit from garden plots and orchards located in schoolyards and community sites, provide resources and support to local growers, and nurture young leaders through the important work of growing, distributing, and selling local food.

When he's not playing in the dirt, you can find him relaxing near calm blue waters with his wife, Angela, and son, Stephen.



BRAD JONES | Garden Educator; Co-founder of Edible Education Experience

SESSION: Panelist, Gardening for Teachers by Teachers

Brad Jones is the Garden Educator and one of the founders of Edible Education Experience, a not-for-profit organization located in Orlando, FL. In this role, Brad collaborates with chefs and educators to plan seasonal crops and sensory tours of their 3000+ sq. ft. garden. He also guides students through experiential lessons the garden has to offer and encourages students to develop a meaningful understanding of our food cycle. Every summer Edible Education Experience hosts a two day teacher academy where Brad leads educators through hands-on lessons for integrating gardening into school curriculum. Before his current role, Brad was employed by the City of Orlando Fire Department where he served 25 years as a firefighter and volunteered at his daughter's school where he led an award winning, multi grade gardening program.



QUINN SKINNER | Procurement Standards Director, FDACS SESSION: Moderator, Procurement for Producers by Producers





WHOLE GRAIN YOGURT PARFAIT WITH BALSAMIC STRAWBERRIES



INGREDIENTS				
2 cup nonfat vanilla Greek yogurt	1/4 cup balsamic vinegar			
2 cups fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered	1 cup graham cracker crumbs			
½ cup granulated sugar (can substitute Splenda)	2 tbsp melted butter or Margarine			

Serves 4

- 1. In a bowl, combine hulled and quartered strawberries with sugar or Splenda.
- 2. Toss and let stand for at least 1 hour.
- 3. Add balsamic vinegar to strawberries (a natural syrup from the sugar should now be present).
- 4. In another bowl, mix graham cracker crumbs and melted butter, set aside.

FOR THE ASSEMBLY:

Using a parfait cup, layer in graham cracker crumbs. Then layer in vanilla yogurt. Top with strawberries and the balsamic juice. Dust top with a pinch of any remaining graham cracker crumbs. Refrigerate for 4 hours or overnight.

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


